



# Sorell Council Passes 2019 - 2020 Budget

SORELL COUNCIL endorsed the Annual Plan and Budget for the 2019 – 2020 financial year at the June meeting.

For the 4<sup>th</sup> year in a row, the rate increase is being held to an average of 2.5%. This rise amounts to \$37.42 per year, or approximately 72 cents a week, for an average residential property.

The 2019 - 2020 budget and rates have been *developed in line with Council's Long Term Financial Plan 2016 - 2036 and Long Term Asset Management Plans 2014 - 2034.* The *focus continues to be on maintaining Council's current assets* for their useful life, which means *limited funding for new and upgraded infrastructure.* 

The budget provides *funding for essential services, maintenance* of existing assets and new infrastructure. Significant funds of \$7.97 million have been allocated for new assets and renewal of existing assets, including:

- \$2.38 million to reconstruct and realign road segments
- \$589,000 for *road resheeting*
- \$694,000 for gravel road reseals
- \$113,000 for minor stormwater upgrades and replacements
- \$611,000 for new and upgraded footpaths

• \$475,000 for new unisex change rooms at Pembroke Park • \$775,000 to renew depot equipment and fleet cars

• \$775,000 to renew depot equipment and fleet cars to rise further than the current 2.5% to fund Community Loop Trail at Dodges Ferry

PLANS FOR a 1.2km Community Fitness Loop Trail around Dodges Ferry Primary School are on track thanks to a grant of \$42,800 from the Tasmanian Community Fund and a \$10,000 contribution from School Association fundraising along with support from Sorell Council, Southern Beaches Coastcare and Healthy Horizons Fitness Centre.

Representing the community wrapping around the school, the simple gravel trail will circle the sports oval, the school and Okines Community House and Garden.

The trail is part of Dodges Ferry Primary School's community-driven outdoor classroom strategy that celebrates the school's natural environment and harnesses the many benefits of learning in nature and being active outdoors.

In recent months work has begun to reclaim the playground area between Lagoon Park and the newly fenced Bush Playground and Sorell Council has replaced the old concrete storm-water swale drain (next to the swings) with a planted swale. Landscaping, planting and seating will create an open bush-garden style play area and a meandering path to the beach.

Principal Jarrod Williams said these exciting developments all "value add to the school's philosophy of students learning through inquiry, nature, collaboration, play, questioning and critical thinking."

"We know students learn best when they are engaged, connected to their community and have a say in their learning."

Since 2013 the area around Okines Community House and the Lagoon Park school playground has been evolving in stages as the growing school community works to create more useable outdoor space for their 450+ students.

In recent years members of Dodges Ferry School Association, Okines Community House and Garden, Southern Beaches Coastcare, Southern Beaches Historical Society, Sorell Council, Sorell Rotary and students at the school have *removed cumbungi, made mosaic murals, repaired the shelter shed, installed play equipment, built seating and hosted community events.*



# Taking Action On Waste

WORRIED BY the wasteful ways of modern living? Inspired to fight the War on Waste? Keen to have a Plastic Free July? All of us have a role to play in managing the waste we produce.

A long awaited draft Waste Action Plan is a significant step forward for waste management, resource recovery and related opportunities for jobs growth in Tasmania.

The state government's comprehensive new strategy is based on circular economy principles that make the best use of resources at every stage of the life of a product or material.

#### The draft plan aims to:

• establish a beverage container refund scheme by 2022 • introduce a statewide *levy on waste being dumped in* landfill

• ensure 100% of packaging is reusable, recyclable or compostable by 2025

• reduce waste generated in Tasmania by 5% per person by 2025 and 10% by 2030

- achieve a 40% average recovery rate from all waste streams by 2025 and 80% by 2030
- have the lowest incidence of littering in the country
- by 2023 • phase out problematic and unnecessary plastics by 2030

 reduce the volume of organic waste sent to landfill by 25% by 2025 and 50% by 2030.

In the meantime, the current Rethink Waste statewide *initiative* is helping us to avoid, reduce, reuse and

*recycle* the right way.

Run by 3 regional local government groups -the Cradle Coast Waste Management Group, the Northern Tasmanian Waste Management Group and Waste Strategy South -Rethink Waste coordinates waste management services and awareness of the best ways to reduce waste and recycle effectively.

Some of the simple ways we can rethink waste include: *To AVOID waste:* 

- Take your *travel mug* for your next coffee
- Refill your drink bottle in place of packaged water
- Take your own shopping bags • Choose unpackaged food and products over those
- with excessive packaging *Use containers* instead of plastic wrap for storing leftovers
- Say no to plastic straws.

#### To REDUCE waste:

- Plan ahead and only buy the ingredients you need for the week
- Choose and maintain household items that will last or can be repaired
- Borrow or hire instead of buying if you only need an item for a short time.

#### To REUSE waste:

- Post unwanted items online for sale or giveaway • Hold a garage sale or swap-meet
- Treasure hunt for pre-loved items before buying new -Council tip shops are a great resource too
- Cook up the next meal from left-overs
- · Find new uses for every-day items, such sewing old clothes or fabric items into reusable bags.

The Copping Renewable Energy Facility at Copping.

400 TASMANIAN homes have now received enough energy generated by the re-use of household waste to power them for a year, through a new methane combusting renewable energy initiative at Southern Waste Solutions' Copping Landfill.

The *Copping Renewable Energy Facility* has already exported over 2,000 megawatt hours of electricity since commissioning in February 2019. *The facility's output to-date is equivalent to the energy required to power every house in the surrounding suburb of Copping for approximately 5 years.* 

In a joint project with LMS Energy, who own and operate the facility, the 1MW power generation plant is *forecast to* generate 8,500 megawatt hours each year, which is enough energy to power approximately 1,500 Tasmanian homes around the clock.

> The renewable energy facility utilises landfill gas that was previously combusted by the existing LMS gas flaring facility built in 2012, which together have now abated over 178,000 tonnes of carbon.

The move to renewable energy generation is the latest initiative in world's best waste-management

*practice from Southern Waste Solutions* and sees them contribute to Tasmania's growing clean and green energy reputation.

Ms Bell said the project was the latest in a list of clean and green waste management practices implemented by Southern Waste Solutions. "Southern Waste Solutions is wholly committed to delivering Tasmania world's best practice waste management," she said.

#### Landfill gas is approximately 50 per cent methane (CH4), a harmful greenhouse gas that contributes to the effects of global warming.

Without the abatement process, greenhouse gas emissions that occur naturally from the decomposition of waste would be released into the atmosphere, risking harm to the environment. The project operates with the installation of a series of below ground pipes incorporating gas wells.



# Cervical Cancer - Catch It Early

CANCER COUNCIL Tasmania has delivered a 'Find Cancer Early' education campaign in the areas of Sorell, Dodges Ferry and Tasman Peninsula in the last few months. The Find Cancer Early Project encourages people to participate in the national cancer screening programs for bowel, breast and cervical cancers. These simple screening tests look for particular changes and early signs of cancer before cancer has developed or before any symptoms emerge. We know that people are more likely to survive cancer if cancer is found early, and treatment is commenced before the disease progresses. www.findcancerearly.com.au.

One of our important national cancer scr eening programs, is the *National Cervical Screening Program*, which went through some changes in December 2017. The new Program *invites women aged* 25-74 to participate in cervical screening every 5 years through their doctor. If you have previously participated in the former Pap test, you will need to return for your next screening test 2 years after your last

**Pap test - you will then enter the new 5 yearly schedule.** The new test is looking for the presence of the Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) rather than looking for precancerous changes in the cells. HPV is a common infection that can cause cervical cell changes that may lead to cervical cancer. The new Cervical Screening test is detecting potential problems earlier, and is expected to protect up to 30% more women.

The good news is that *since the introduction of the HPV vaccination and the regular cervical screening, we have seen a dramatic drop in the incidence of cervical cancer.* If you are due for testing, contact your doctor to book an appointment. If at any age you have symptoms, such as unusual vaginal bleeding, discharge or pain during sex, you should see your doctor as soon as possible.

# GardenWRAP



We have now past the winter solstice. Although the days are still short and cold they are getting longer every day and that bit closer to tomato season again.

However, now is a great time to get very excited in the garden and plant loads of good things. With some lovely rain starting to soak into the soil and short cool days, this is the season to plant all of the deciduous plants. Oaks, maples, elms and many other northern hemisphere trees transplant so much better at this time of year when they are planted as bare-rooted trees (they are cheaper to buy, easier to handle and transplant better when they don't have a big pot attached to the bottom).

Also, look out for those great perennials like rhubarb, asparagus and berries like raspberries, strawberries etc. All of these can be planted now for great results from bare-rooted crowns or runners. The great thing about planting out now is that these plants will get settled and be ready to charge away in spring as the days lengthen and warm.

Of course now is the time of year we all notice barerooted fruit trees piled up high for sale in the garden centres. Proper garden centres / plant nurseries are much better places to buy fruit trees from than the big places that focus more on home improvements and building materials. Plant nurseries care properly for their fruit trees they sell and also provide good advice on variety selection. Fruit trees are great and whilst the random guess at a garden centre may just well work out, there are many things to consider, or questions to ask when choosing varieties.



We all know about pollination and how it is required

for fruit to set. So make sure you choose varieties that flower at the same time and are compatible with each other to maximise yields.

Fruit trees have seasons too, and within their seasons there are some that produce early, middle or late in their season. This can be a way to spread the harvest out over a longer time period rather than have all the trees ripen at the same time. Sometimes in short seasons and cooler growing conditions, late-ripening fruit varieties of peaches and nectarines may not ripen every year. Early ripening fruit varieties tend to mostly escape birds, but later varieties of fruit that hang on the trees well into late autumn and beyond are keenly sought after by birds. As such these varieties (they are well worth growing as they will store the longest, well through winter) will need some sort of strategy to protect them from bird predation.

Fruit trees also vary in the time they flower. This is a consideration to be aware of when choosing trees, especially if you live in an area that gets late frosts. Trees like almonds flower very early in the season and are greatly affected by late frosts.

Fruit trees are grafted onto rootstock. The rootstock controls the height and vigour of the tree, the soil type preferences and some pest and disease resistance. Do some homework and ask some questions to find the correct rootstock for your purpose and growing conditions. Dwarf trees maybe fantastic as they are short, easy to net/cage and prune, however they often require more fertile soil than larger rootstock types. Dwarf trees have a less vigorous root system, and as such, do not anchor themselves as strongly into the ground as larger trees. Dwarf trees may require additional support by staking, a wire trellis or fence/ building to grow on. A smaller, shallower root system also requires careful summer watering. Dwarf trees are great and produce good quality fruit; they just need different care from larger trees.

When it comes time for planting out fruit trees, I like to wash off the roots in a big container so that they can be inspected. Look for damaged, broken or badly bent roots. Cut these roots back with sharp secateurs. The tree will respond and form new healthy roots once it is in the ground. By washing off the roots just prior to planting the tree out, I ensure that the roots are moist when they go into the planting hole. In can be highly beneficial to soak the roots in a seaweed solution, which not only moistens the roots, but has the added benefits of helping reduce transplant shock, and promote new root growth.

Plant out your tree into the pre-dug hole. This is the important bit. Don't rush this job and do it poorly. Remember it is much better to plant a \$1 tree into a \$10 hole than the other way around. Dig the hole so that there is enough room to spread the roots out (the tree will be there for its life and you don't want to start it off being root-bound with twisted/bent roots). By spreading out the roots you help the tree to anchor itself into the ground quicker and allow the tree to send out new roots in all directions in search of food and water. Make sure the hole is the correct depth. You will

notice a soil mark on your new tree that indicates the depth that it was growing in its nursery bed before it was dug up

feed the tree. By adding to the top of the planting hole, nutrients from compost or aged manure will work into the soil rather than be in contact with the roots of the newly planted tree.

Remember to firm the soil in around the tree and give it a good deep watering to remove any large air pockets.

This is the time to stake the tree, if you need to. Two stakes are better than one. Driven into the soil just beyond the root ball, two stakes allow for a soft tie to be secured in a figure-of-eight fashion. This way the tree can move a little without being ringbarked whilst it develops strong roots.

The majority of trees will need a good prune now (or may have been done in the nursery for you). The exception to the pruning rule is trees like a Silver Birch that may need a tall, unbranched trunk. Fruit trees especially respond really well by having an initial hard prune. Prune to shape (depending on what you want your tree to be when mature – do some research), but mostly prune to match the loss of roots and encourage good strong new growth rather than spindly shoots on the ends of long branches. Removing at least a third is encouraged (it does not reduce the monetary value of your initial purchase, but rather sets your tree up for many bountiful years ahead).

So now is definitely a positive time to think of the future and plant some fabulous trees for yourself and the next generation.

This soil mark is a pretty good indication of the depth the tree should be replanted at. It is important to make sure you do not bury the graft union (the funny knobbly bit just above the soil mark on the trunk).

It is worth loosening the soil around the tree and beneath the root zone (especially in compacted ground), you don't have to dig that extra soil out, simply loosen it. In my experience, I have found that it is better to cover the roots with the parent soil and firm in to make the tree stable. Then, a little compost or organic matter can be added to the top of the hole to help

WOOD, GLASS, agate, stone, flowers, aluminium and brass are some of the materials that Ben uses to create his kaleidoscopes. The timbers are black heart Sassafras, Myrtle, Huon pine and Blackwood, all of which he prepares himself from logs sourced across the state. He says "I used to buy rough sawn or dressed timber but accessing suitable pieces has become difficult. I now have a horizontal band saw which is great for producing the

sizes I need; and it also allows me to do that in winter, when the wood dries slower, which is most desirable for good quality items. His band saw is also available to help locals who need specific timber sizes.

Ben's interest in kaleidoscopes began while he was still at school. At 18 he was already involved in work experience with the Kaleidoscope Company at Bream Creek. At that time it was owned by Strato Anagnostis, who, in tune with Ben's strong interest in timber, offered him a full time position, "So I took it," he said. When Strato moved to the mainland in 2002 Ben took over the business. In 2003 he bought a property in Eaglehawk Neck and moved his studio/ workshop there.

The creation of his kaleidoscopes involves more than just his efforts. His wife handles the administration side of things, and he has the input of the Clements family of Franklin who provide hand blown glass balls, and Rob and Margie Kirk who contribute hand made fused glass

wheels. For the mirrors, Ben makes his own, using glass, to which aluminium is evaporated onto in a vacuum chamber, and of course he spends much time turning or sculpting the wooden parts of the kaleidoscopes.

As to the training side of things, he has completed a course in Small Business Management and has a Diploma in Art, Craft and Design, both from TAFE.



He has shown works at Handmark Gallery in Salamanca Place and at Saddler's Court Gallery, Richmond. He also has an online store at www.kaleidoscopecompany.com.
