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Mayor's Report

GOOD NEWS for commuters to Hobart. Work has recently began on the temporary fix to improve traffic flow and ease the daily bottleneck at the Hobart airport roundabout. Work will include the construction of a second lane along the existing roundabout on the Tasman Highway at Holyman Avenue, along with improvements to the entry and exit points. These improvements will help to combat the queues and travel delays currently being experienced, before work starts on the planned Hobart Airport Interchange, which will be a major upgrade to the area. The traffic congestion in this area is experienced by so many people in our community so I welcome these works and look forward to seeing improvement in the traffic flow as soon as possible. Please be mindful that there may be delays during the works and to allow yourself some extra travel time for your trip.

Public consultation meetings between the Department of State Growth and the community will be held on a regular basis during these works. Planning work including feasibility and geological assessments is also progressing on the other South East Traffic Solution projects - the Airport Interchange project, Tasman Highway at the Tasmania Golf Club, Midway Point intersection, Sorell Southern Bypass and Arthur Highway overtaking lanes at Iron Creek. I look forward to keeping you all updated on the development of these significant infrastructure projects.

There were lots of good vibes from Council's recent Seniors Week event. A country inspired BBQ lunch was enjoyed by 140 of our older people at the Sorell Memorial Hall. A big apology to all those who missed out on this wonderful event - its popularity keeps growing each year. Those lucky enough to get a seat were well entertained by yarns and poems from Dennis Turner and some country crooning from local band *The Country Strangers*. All in attendance thoroughly enjoyed themselves and I received so much positive feedback. Well done to

the staff at Council, The Lions Club of Sorell and student helpers from Sorell School for organising such a great event.

In last months' edition of The Sorell Times I thanked outgoing Councillors Lindsay White and Graeme Evans and Deputy Mayor Brett McDonald for their contributions to Council and the community. This month I'd like to officially welcome our three new Councillors to Sorell Council - Geoffrey Jackson, Beth Nichols and

Melinda Reed. The three will be sworn in at the November Council meeting and I'm sure they will all quickly adapt to their new roles and be great representatives for their community. At the time of writing this report the outcome of the vote for the positon of Deputy Mayor

Mitch at Midway for Mental Health Week

SPEAK UP! Stay ChatTY founder and mental health ambassador Mitch McPherson received a warm welcome at Midway Point Neighbourhood House during Mental Health Week.

In a powerful and frank presentation Mitch shared his personal story of loss since his younger brother Ty died by suicide.

"Ty was 18 years old, the life of the party, popular and it happened the day before he was to start a building apprenticeship," explained Mitch. At that time Mitch was working as a glazier but when Ty took his own life, Mitch turned the devastating loss into something constructive. "I wanted to speak about it because I wanted no-one else to experience what we had," Mitch said. "Nothing is so bad that you can't talk about it."

The well known 'footy shorts' sticker was designed to pay tribute to Ty and Mitch set up Stay ChatTY to encourage everyone to speak up and seek help when they have issues or go through difficult times.

"What started as me sharing my story has now grown into a registered not-for-profit that works hard to raise mental health awareness and reduce stigma," he said.

"I believe my story resonates with many people. People who, like my family at the time, might not think mental health is a priority or that they will ever be affected by it."

Mitch asks people to remember five things: conversations matter; listening saves lives; get the help you need; be kind; it's ok no to be ok. Now in partnership with Relationships Australia, Mitch and the SPEAK UP! Stay ChatTY team, work together to *prevent suicide* by making mental health a part of every day conversations and encouraging people to seek help when they need it.

Mitch and his team present to community groups, workplaces, sporting clubs and schools, runs fundraisers and community events, travelling around Tasmania and other states to raise awareness about mental health and suicide and how we can help each other out in tough times.

Mitch's visit to Midway Point was organised by social work student Jordehnne Spouse, as part of her university placement at the Neighbourhood House.

Jordehnne was successful in applying for a grant from the Mental Health Council of Tasmania to invite Mitch to talk to local people and share morning tea together.

"Mental health is a huge issue that's not talked about enough so it's great to be able to have Mitch come along and help spread the word that it's ok not to be ok," she said.

Assistant Co-ordinator Melissa Henderson wants more people to know that *Midway Point Neighbourhood House is a welcoming place you can come, have a chat and get the advice and referrals that you need.*

"It's important for our community to know that there are people who will listen and will help and go that next step for someone," Mel said.

Bobcat Driving Council Efficiency



COUNCIL RECENTLY purchased a new Bobcat and its arrival will help increase Council's efficiency and productivity, which is great news for the community.

Council's Works Programmer for Roads, Ken Grierson, says the new piece of machinery will allow the outdoor workforce to carry out a wide range of jobs and provide a wide range of benefits. "The Bobcat will work alongside our existing backhoe in the roads crew which means multiple maintenance tasks can now occur simultaneously." "The Bobcat is a more industrious and robust piece of machinery than our backhoe. It will allow our work crews to complete maintenance jobs in a more timely and efficient manner, which will lead to an increase in our productivity." Says Ken.

Ken says Council can use the Bobcat for various road maintenance projects, as well as for slashing of Council reserves using the mowing attachment.

Mayor Kerry Vincent says the Bobcat can potentially be resourced shared with neighbouring Councils. "Work efficiencies aside, the Bobcat also has the ability to generate some additional income for Council and increase the number of hours of possible operation."

"Council work crews will now be less reliant on outside contractors to complete some works. The ability to complete additional work in-house will also boost productivity in completing scheduled works to meet the expectations of our community." says Kerry. Sorell Council has had a greater focus on maintenance works over the past few years, so as to achieve the full, useful life of all assets. Kerry says the Bobcat will allow Council to maintain it's assets in a more efficient and effective manner to the standards set out in its Asset Management Strategy and Long Term Financial Plan.

The Bobcat skid-steer loader with broom, slasher and planer attachments was purchased via the Local Government Procurement System, for a cost of \$157,000.


There were *also 13 moving* videos directed and edited by *Troy Melville*, a former ABC videographer.





Having Our Say **MELINDA REED**

THERE'S BEEN a lot of 'electioning' going on this year. We went to the polling booths for the state election in March 2018, and again in May to elect the first Legislative Council member for the new seat of Prosser.

Then in October we had the opportunity to post our ballots to decide the local government elections across 28 of the state's 29 Councils (Glenorchy had theirs earlier).

Unlike the state and federal elections, local government voting is not compulsory, so the returns vary from less than 50% to more than 75% across the Councils. Smaller communities do much better with around 70-80% of votes returned while Sorell Municipality is typically similar to the city electorates at around 55%.

As of October 26 with the voting almost closed, the voting rate for the 2018 Sorell Council election for Deputy Mayor was just over 51% (5,871 of the 11,393 people eligible to vote). As with other smaller municipalities

around Tasmania, the voting rate for Tasman Municipality was higher at 64% (1,520 of the 2,372 people eligible to vote). In the 2014 Council elections 54.13% of Sorell's 10,164 electors and 70.77% of the 2340 Tasman electors returned their ballot papers, in comparison with 54.58% statewide.

In the daily media, online and in other discussions, the relatively low vote has prompted calls for changes to local government voting - some say to make local government voting compulsory as it is in other states; some say to make it a single day ballot at polling stations like the state and federal elections; some even say to do away with local government altogether.

I was honoured to be one of the 481 Tasmanians nominated for the Council elections as well as one of the 135 candidates standing for deputy mayor.

There were 9 candidates for the 9 Sorell Councillor positions, so all 9 were elected

without need for a vote. It was an exciting surprise to have an instant result when the Electoral Commission announced the nominations, but it also left many people wondering if it's better to have a wider field and know more precisely how voters have responded to each candidate. Perhaps you or someone you know could have nominated too.

And how does Tasmania's literacy rate have an impact on voting? Just under half of all Tasmanian adults are living with low literacy, so how adequately are they included and represented in a process that relies on reading and comparing candidate statements and posting the vote?

Perhaps already knowing who you are voting for is what makes such a difference in smaller communities. Perhaps that's an attribute worth keeping as we look towards future local government reforms

If a minute though, is devoted to allowing them to speak to you, the reward may be the acknowledgement of their human passion and the discovery of the intermingling elements of pain, sympathy, sensitivity and understanding.

While not in the league of Francis Bacon, James Gleeson (who both used oil paints) or Dan Verkys (who is a digital artist) *Lars is truly representative of the current flavour of "Dark Side" paintings and at 24yrs is still relatively young.* For one, because his works are unique, I believe he has the chance of a renowned future in art.

His usual medium is charcoal on paper with the highlights and accents done in acrylics, and he gets his inspiration from a wide variety of subject matter including life, from horror movies, the occult, witchcraft and psychopaths.



GardenWRAP

November

Spring is well underway now, with rampant growth and flowers everywhere. It is a great time to garden, as results quickly show up with warm season new growth. Plants are flowering, setting seed and re-sprouting. Insects are feasting on nectar and pollen alongside many birds. In turn, many birds are enjoying their fill of tasty insects as well as feeding young on the nest. It is a great time of year when everything 'comes alive' again after winter. It is the time of year when southern gardeners get to plant out lots of different food plants into the garden. Gardening with the seasons allows us to eat local food with the seasons, that is not only 'trendy', but more importantly, healthy for you too.

If you haven't already filled your garden, then there is still time to cram in some more food plants.

All of those fabulous summer foods like tomatoes, capsicums, eggplants, chillies, corn, pumpkins,

zucchini, cucumber, beans, carrots, beetroot, spring onions, salad greens, potatoes and more can all go into the ground and get growing now. With some food plants we try not to sow a large crop at any one time, rather we like to sow a smaller amount and sow in succession several times during the season. For example, cucumbers are hard to store but are delicious fresh from the garden. So we sow a few plants several times over the growing season to extend the harvest. The same is true for corn, as we do three to four separate sowings spaced four to six weeks apart. Carrots, beetroot, beans, salad greens and zucchini are all plants we sow several times during the season.

TOP 5 Kids Favourite Food Plants

Kids really enjoy gardening too. Some kids have great attention spans and will weed, dig and plant, water and harvest for well over an hour. Most kids however, do not last quite so long and as such often need a little help to get started and finish the job. Kids are capable of most tasks in the garden, except for maybe some of the heavier jobs like pulling out big weeds or moving bulk materials.

Seeds are fascinating to kids and big kids alike, the range of seed shapes, sizes and colours hugely diverse and amazing. Kids get great satisfaction planting seeds and watching them grow. They will check on them each day to see if they have 'come up' and then how quickly they are growing. Then once it is time (often a bit too early) to harvest, then the excitement levels tend to get very high. The reward of picking fresh food from the garden is something that kids feel a huge sense of pride from. It truly is a fabulous activity to do with young people to foster the wonder of growing, but also a great way to extend the range of healthy foods our little ones eat and to instil healthy eating habits from an early age.

Friends often ask us for suggestions on growing food for their families. In our experience, the following plants have proved very popular with most children:

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Strawberries: A punnet full of 1: bought strawberries vanishes in no time, as many parents would know. For the price of a few punnets, you can easily establish your own patch at home and harvest many more strawberries, fresh directly from the garden. The joy of going on a treasure hunt down to the strawberry patch is loved by kids (and adults alike), and peeking under the leaves to look for ripe fruit is part of the fun. Strawberries are easy to grow in most garden soils, and can even be grown in pots, planters or hanging baskets, as long as they are given good soil. During the summer, moisture is the key to producing tasty, juicy fruit and lots of it. Plants in the ground will not need as much water as plants in pots. However, all plants will benefit from a mulch to help keep the soil moist (pine needles work well as do many other mulches). There are loads of varieties available locally to grow, from deliciously fragrant, small alpine strawberries, to large-fruited varieties. Try a few varieties to extend the season and provide different flavours. At this time of year, plants would be available as potted plants. Keep an eye out during winter for bundles of strawberry runners that are a much cheaper way to establish a larger patch.

2: Peas and Snow Peas: Easy to plant from seed in the garden, quick to produce and sweet and tasty for kids to eat these nutritious snacks. Peas can be bush or climbing (need a trellis), and the growing tips or tendrils can also be eaten before they produce pods. Soak the seed overnight before planting into the garden, making sure the seed is well covered (to keep hidden from birds). Shelling varieties of bush peas ripen quickly, and sometimes all at once, whereas snow peas can be harvested over a longer season, providing pockets full of crisp sweet pods to take on adventures.

3: *Carrots*: Kids delight in pulling carrots up out of the ground, starting from around match stick-size, up to the much-prized 'whopper'. Carrots are not hard to grow and do not need rich ground. They prefer weed free sites and require the soil to be kept moist to germinate. Carrots are best grown from seed (never purchase punnets). Carrots come in a variety of shapes, sizes and colours depending on the variety. One of the fastest varieties to mature is the 'Purple Dragon'. A cool name for kids, it is a purple skinned orange-fleshed carrot that is great to eat when young and crisp, and fun to mix a few in with the classic orange varieties for kids to find. Carrots come in big and small, golf ball sizes and different colours, including white, yellow and even (almost) red. They are fun to grow, have neat seed and pretty flowers that are hugely beneficial (for insects) in the garden, and can even be left to save your own seed.

cucumber in a sunny site that has some rich compost added. Cucumbers often grow as a vine and can be either left to sprawl along the ground or grown up a trellis. They do however, crop better and produce sweeter fruit if they are kept moist, especially during hot summer weather. Cucumbers are easy to grow so long as they have a rich, sunny, moist site. They can be found in all sorts of varieties from standard green skins, to yellow, round white, thorned, small pickling, and even sour/ zesty types. Seed or seedlings can go in now and can even be planted into large pots.

5: Beans: Summer-growing beans are fantastic. The crisp, tender and sweet young beans are hugely enjoyed by kids. Bush beans are easy as no trellis is required and they crop heavily in a small space. They are best grown from seed that is pre-soaked overnight and planted into any reasonable garden soil. Climbing beans are best sown the same way but will require a trellis to grow up. Beans have a large variety too. Pod colour can be green, yellow, purple, or red and speckled. A rainbow mix of green, yellow and purple bush beans are great to grow for kids. The yellow and purple ones are easy for kids to see (a few green ones will be left behind so that even the bigger 'kids' get some). Pick beans when they are young, crisp and tender. This will help the harvest last longer as the bushes will produce more beans.

There are many more foods worth growing with kids in mind. Kids love digging for potatoes as it's like finding hidden treasure, especially if you grow a few different coloured varieties. Husking sweet corn is like unwrapping a present. Edible flowers are amazing treats eaten fresh or mixed into salads, icy poles, biscuits, or as stunning edible decorations on a cake. Finding a ripe Cape Gooseberry in its very own 'lolly wrapper' is lots of fun. Then there are all of the fabulous varieties of fruit that we can grow in our climate.

Growing and eating food with kids is a fun and rewarding activity that provides the opportunity for kids to live and eat healthily throughout their lives.

Tomato: know, sow, grow, feast is a new hard back book celebrating Australian heirloom tomatoes. Heirloom tomatoes are timeless, and these colourful heritage gems - full to bursting with juicy deliciousness - are enjoying a renaissance in Australia.



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
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Vale: Max Bellette **Crossword Creator**

FOR OVER 15 years Port Arthur resident Max Bellett entertained thousands with their favourite intellectual pastime - the crossword.

Max boggled the minds of readers of the Tasman Gazette and Sorell Times with his ingenious plethora of encrypted codes. His following of serious puzzlers and the casual enthusiast have been challenged over the years in historical information, literary characters, geographical terms, weird abbreviations, foreign words, technical jargon and general knowledge - they have puzzled over a range of disguised meanings. However Max was not one for cryptic problems deciphering anagrams, synonyms and spoonerisms. (So no one receives a blushing crow.)

In 1996 Max was involved with the printing and production of the Tasman Gazette when it was an A4 Newsletter; it was there he was asked by a fellow worker to take on the role of *crossword puzzle producer.* Temperate Zone Tasmania owner Gaye Wright took over publication of the Tasman Gazette in 2003, turning it into a tabloid newspaper, with Max continuing on as Crossword puzzle producer, he later also started supplying the Sudoku puzzle.

When asked about his methods and techniques he showed, with a wry smile, *his trusted companions, two dictionaries* hefty volumes (though one claimed to be concise) both well dog eared and covers lost through over use and age (easily over 20 years old). He admitted that he used a computer program which set up the basic ground work, as creating crossword puzzles is notoriously difficult. Recently in the US the scandal of plagiarism has raised many 'cross words'.

Max would enter into the software program, the pattern and number of clues he wanted for the crossword. Then spend time finding the meanings of the words and creating interesting and appropriate clues. He had a policy of no rude words or ones with too obscure a meaning. If this happened he would delete it and set the computer up for a new potential crossword puzzle. *He liked to get ahead* and has been known to have crossword *puzzles ready up to year in advance.* The clueless puzzle has a slightly different technique and he explained it helped that he had a bad memory so when he was working out the letters to be given as starters (usually 3 or 4) he felt like he was doing as the reader would -without


knowledge of the answers!

Over the 15 years he had few complaints, one at the beginning when he accidently gave the wrong clues to the puzzle so it was impossible. Another complaint was actually a compliment as the crossword had been printed too small for the reader to complete it and they requested a larger copy (from the Editor) as they so enjoyed it so much.

The broad range of difficulty and styles conventional, cryptic to clueless - mean crosswords can challenge people of all levels of ability. Many like to do a crossword as part of their routine. The Queen chooses to do a crossword every *day.* Ironically Max admitted he himself struggled with Cryptic crosswords and preferred playing Rummiking (a number game) with his wife on a Saturday night or doing a Sudoku.
